Joint response to Veolia's planning application for an Energy Recovery Facility (ERF)

The main thrust of the joint response to this plan is as follows:

Energy Alton supports the incineration of waste in principle as a means of generating renewable energy from waste which cannot be recycled and should no longer be sent to landfill.

However we object to this proposed ERF for 2 significant reasons -


- 1. It is not needed at all as there is already enough capacity to meet the likely residual waste once we have reached the target 60% recycling rate.
- 2. It is not in right location being a long distance from the main sources of commercial and industrial waste in Hampshire.

Lobbying

ACAN lobbying group has strong links with Hampshire Climate Action Network (HCAN), led by Chris Holloway, and she coordinated a contribution to the Hampshire County Council (HCC) debate about the climate change strategy. Philippa Brealey spoke on behalf of ACAN making 2 points:

- The urgency of the climate crisis is not being recognised and a target of 2050 is too late.
- 2. ACAN and other groups in the county could make a powerful contribution.



Philippa was delighted to note that 4 different councillors referred to her talk in the ensuing debate. Then on 8th August 4 ACAN members attended an online meeting of interested community groups convened by HCC to discuss their Climate Strategy – what they are getting right and what is missing.

What became clear from the presentation was that even with a 2050 target the measures HCC are proposing are not sufficient to get us right down to zero emissions – the remainder, it was suggested, would be mopped up by some carbon sequestration method not yet available!

After the meeting many of the groups met again under the HCAN umbrella to decide how to put pressure on HCC to treat the climate crisis as the emergency it is.

Alton Repair Cafe

After several months during which Alton Repair Café volunteers have only been able to do occasional repairs for people by arrangement, it was wonderful to hold a special open-air session on 8th August under the awning in the Public Gardens alongside the Town Council's summer market.

A team of 5 repairers completed a dozen repairs of textiles, lamps, bikes, antique weighing scales, a time piece and more. We ran out of time, so some repairs will be done at another time by agreement between the repairer and the client. One repairer undertook a ceramic repair on his way home!

In the reception gazebo our wonderful reception team welcomed visitors and ensured that chairs, pens and repair items were disinfected between customers with copious amounts of sanitiser.



Our next special open-air session will be within the community market in the **Public Gardens on Saturday 12**th **September 10.00 – 1.00 pm.** Spread the word! The team can do small mechanical and electrical repairs, bikes, and clothes and textiles. We will still have a smaller than usual team, but we can always make other arrangements.

A Campaigning Voice for Alton's Cyclists

Cycle Alton was launched in May 2020 partly in response to the Covid-19 crisis, but mainly to give Alton's cycling groups and individuals a campaigning voice for safer cycling and better cycling infrastructure. Focussing on promoting utility cycling as the natural choice for short commuting journeys, trips around town and to and from the villages.


They already have over 80 supporters, interest from local councillors, Damian Hinds, MP for East Hampshire, and representatives from the five cycling groups in Alton: Cycling UK, Alton Cycling Club, U3A Social Cycling, Hearty Riders and the White Hart Vueltas.

They have proposed three options for reducing through-traffic in the Town Centre to buses only and are

currently collating responses. All options would reduce noise and pollution and would include more cycle parking, planters and seating. The 30 min free parking spaces would be moved to Alton car parks to replace those in the Town Centre. In light of feedback already received they will be recommending the retention of some blue badge spaces.

ACAN's Permaculture Group

30 people joined a live link with the Permaculture Paradise Institute in Malawi to hear Luwayo Biswick talk about how permaculture techniques have been transforming lives in Malawi. It was inspiring to hear how working with nature, multicropping and the rediscovery of old skills and knowledge has proved, as Luwayo put it:

"Africa is rich, we have all it takes to end hunger, poverty, malnutrition and many other problems using local resources."

ACAN's adopted charity is the GUMBI Education Fund which is sending 4 young people from the Gumbi villages to the institute for 6 months to learn these techniques.

Since the online talk £1250 has been raised towards the £5000 necessary to support them during their training.

Alton Community Cupboard

The Community Cupboard is now supporting an average of 92 families in Alton and the surrounding area. Our wonderful volunteers are working hard to collect donations from the local shops and deliver food boxes six days a week. We are now also receiving donations from local allotments and windfalls. A true community project, for the community, by the community.

We are now operating from the Community Centre but may be moving again soon, as we continue our hunt for donated premises, to provide this service to the public for free.



We will soon be changing our operation from delivering to collections, asking those who are able, to come and collect their boxes on a pre-booked basis. For those who are housebound, the volunteers at Alton Mutual Aid will help us with deliveries. The local shops continue to support us, allowing us to collect lots of bread, fruit, veg, flowers and even sweets and drinks so we are able to donate a nice variety.

The share continues to have a steady number of visitors each week with hearty enthusiasm for the concept from all that visit. The band of regulars is growing and the environmental message appears to be getting out to a broad audience alongside the other benefits to the community. All-in-all a positive result.
