Young ACAN 'Treasure not Trash' Conference

Young ACAN has been supporting young people in and around Alton to become agents for positive change since 2021. On January 31, it hosted its third ecoconference at Alton College, bringing together 82 students from 12 local schools. The 'Treasure Not Trash' conference, funded by the Transition Network, aimed to empower young minds by transforming them into trash-fighting superheroes, equipped with the knowledge of how to reduce waste and how to share this information with their school communities.

The students were welcomed by Young ACAN Lead, Emma Jones. Hampshire County Council Waste Champion, Roland Richardson, presented students with frightening statistics about the problem of waste, including the surprising fact that food waste and clothing, not plastic, make up the majority of global waste. During the conference, students participated in diverse workshops covering topics such as sustainable fashion, composting, ocean plastic and waste-free food. Through these workshops, the students learned practical ways to reduce waste and promote sustainability in their schools and beyond, including visiting a refill shop like Fill-Up in Alton or making a patch to mend jeans.





To conclude the conference, students and teachers were treated to the premiere of a film about Alton's Repair Cafe, made by film students from Alton College. This showcases the value of repairing rather than discarding items. Additionally, a competition was launched to create a comic strip featuring a waste-monster fighting superhero, with the winning entry set to be turned into an animated film by local artist Flossie Waters.

The Young ACAN 'Treasure Not Trash' Conference was a resounding success, leaving a positive impact on both students and teachers as well as a shared commitment to a greener future. The knowledge gained and enthusiasm shown by these young trash-fighting superheroes will be shared with their peers in their schools, making a lasting impact on their communities. By empowering young people, we can harness their energy, creativity and commitment to drive transformative change and secure a healthier, more sustainable future for all.

PeCAN's 'Fruit Tree in Every Garden'

Saturday, 22nd February saw the return on PeCAN's 'Fruit Tree in Every Garden'. The ACAN team, supported by Alton Men's Shed, distributed approximately 420 trees to 170 keen growers. A resounding success! These trees will not only draw in carbon dioxide but will provide delicious fruit for decades to come, cutting down on transportation and waste. Fruit trees also provide habitats and food for wildlife. Whatever isn't eaten by people will certainly be devoured by something else instead!





Community in Action at the Repair Cafe

Alton Repair Café has now been going for several years and has made a huge difference during that time, not just in terms of the climate, but to the people who brings their items along. Not only does the sterling work save people money but it also makes a positive difference by saving cherished items from being thrown away.

The February session of the Repair Café had many delightful highlights:

- The joy of a lady who brought in an antique china doll (about 100 years old). She had a lovely photograph of her great aunt clutching the doll. James reattached the head and legs.
- A 1885 Jones wrought-iron sewing machine which had been found in a garage belonging to the current owner's grandmother. It was partially restored and the owner went away with tips on how to further free up the mechanism.
- An elderly gent with poor eyesight whose cassette player was successfully repaired. He donated a tin of toiletries by way of thanks!
- One woman had come along to the last session and was so thrilled she wanted to show her elderly dad how it all worked.
- Finally, there was a visit from a couple in Twickenham. They run the Repair Café there and their hobby appears to be touring: we were the thirteenth café that they had visited!

Give your electricals a little love

In the UK, we discard 103,000 tonnes of electricals every year instead of reusing or recycling them. Binning electricals means that the raw materials like gold, copper, aluminium and steel can't be used again and will need to be produced again for your new kit. If we all recycled our old electricals, we could cut as much carbon dioxide as taking 3.8 million cars off the road.

If your electricals still work, sell them second hand or pass them on to a charity. If they're broken, you could get them fixed (or learn to fix them yourself) at a Repair Café. If they're beyond repair, recycle them at your local household waste recycling centre. Old mobile phones are taken by Oxfam who raise money through the recycling of the metals inside.
